Fun Facts: The very first Jackson County Fair was held September 30 – October 3, 1914. The Jackson County Fair Association (JCFA) was incorporated as a nonprofit organization on February 15, 1949 to sponsor and host a Spring Carnival and Fall Agricultural Fair each year. These two events provide funding for programs such as Veterans Helping Veterans (VHV) handicap-accessibility ramps, short-term assistance for homeless and other Veterans in need, mentoring at-risk Veterans, transportation to VA appointments, patriotic education in elementary and middle schools, and funding scholarships for local high school students. Membership in JCFA consists of members of the American Legion Post 30, VFW Post 6073 and their respective Auxiliaries. All work is conducted on a volunteer basis.

- 1. Information & General Rules apply to every Competition, Division, and Class. Additional requirements or restrictions will be listed in the Class Criteria.
- No variation from Division or Classes in this publication will be allowed. Please email suggestions to info@jacksoncountyalfair.com to be considered for the next Fair.
- 3. <u>ENTRY FEES</u>: There is no fee to enter Scarecrow Contest, Antique Tractor Contest, Feature Exhibit Booth (Division 1), Flower Show or Divisions 2 23 (Individual Exhibits) for competition. Cattle Show Entry Fee is listed on Page 41.
- 4. <u>AGE DIVISIONS:</u> ADULT: Age 18 and older YOUTH: Age 17 and younger Youth Subcategories: Pre-School (Ages 3-5); Elementary (Ages 6-9); Junior (Ages 14-17); and Senior (Age 14-17) or as noted in Class Criteria
- 5. LABELS FOR ENTRIES (3 per entry required). Bring three (3) adhesive labels per entry. Labels should be no larger than a standard mailing label (1" X 2-5/8") and must include Exhibitor's first and last name and complete address (including zip code) on the label submitted for the Exhibitor Tag. Helpful Hint: Pre-printed labels received from various charities and other organizations work great for this!
- 6. ENTRIES: Entries will be accepted on Friday Sept 19th from 9:00a to 4:00p and Saturday Sept 20th from 9:00a to 1:00p. You must be in line no later than 3:55p Friday and 12:55p Saturday in order to submit your entry(ies). Antique Tractor Competition entries may request appointment to submit their tractor on Sun 9/21, Mon 9/22 or Tue 9/23. Late entries will not be accepted. NO EXCEPTIONS!

7. WHERE TO SUBMIT ENTRIES:

SCARECROW CONTEST & ANTIQUE TRACTOR COMPETITION

Submit entries at south entrance of the Commercial Building Pre-Registration is required for all Scarecrow & Antique Tractor submissions

FLOWER SHOW (Divisions 17 – 23)

Submit all entries at the Flower House

8. All entries in Divisions 2 - 16 must be submitted to the Registration Tables on the north end of the Exhibit Building. Exhibitors entered in Scarecrow Contest, Antique Tractor Competition or Divisions 2 – 23 who are not actively assembling or working on a Feature Exhibit Booth are not allowed inside the Exhibit Building at any time prior to the opening of the Fair.

- 9. Exhibitors are not allowed to view Registration Books, nor are Exhibitors allowed to ask what Classes have or have not been entered. Violation will result in Exhibitor being disqualified and banned from entering any exhibits at next year's Fair and all entries already submitted for this year's Fair will not be judged nor awarded ribbon or premium, nor will additional entries be accepted for this year. Only those people actively working on a Feature Exhibit Booth will be allowed inside Exhibit Building on Friday & Saturday, and all must exit building by 1:00p on Sat.
- 10. Individuals may enter up to two (2) entries per Class in Divisions 2 6 and 8 23 unless noted in the Class criteria. Exhibitors in Division 7 are not limited in number of entries per Class. If Exhibitor is awarded multiple places in the same Class for Divisions 2 6 and 8 23, both ribbons will be awarded but only the highest premium will be paid. All ribbons and premiums awarded will be paid regardless of number of entries by single Exhibitor in Division 7.
- 11. Entries are prohibited from having any visible information that identifies the Entrant <u>except</u> in Division 1. 'Division 1 Feature Exhibit Booths' may include identifying information such as Organization/Club name in the display.
- 12. Entries must be entered in the name of the organization, grower or person who created the Article. Purchasing produce and representing as homegrown, purchasing mass-produced pre-fab kits or an already assembled scale model (except where allowed in specific Youth Classes), or entering items in someone else's name (including spouse or child) they did not grow or create is prohibited.
- 13. Exhibitor may only enter items in "Wildcard" Classes <u>if</u> a Class does not exist that the entry should be entered. **Entry in "Wildcard" classes simply because a Class already has entries is strictly prohibited.** Article will be moved by JCFA volunteers to the correct Class per Rule #16 prior to judging.
- 14. You may enter an Article for someone else with their permission. By entering you are attesting that the person named on the Exhibitor Tag personally grew, created, or completed ALL work in order for it to be entered in their name. Submissions on behalf of someone else are not allowed in Photography Divisions.
- 15. Any item consisting of two or more matching pieces (pair, set, suit, etc.) shall be entered as one Article.
- 16. Exhibits entered in the wrong Class, erroneously or not, will be transferred to the correct Class for which it should have been entered prior to judging by JCFA.
- 17. JCFA's Fair Board reserves the right to determine the suitability of all entries and has sole authority to reject entries if deemed inappropriate or unfit to display. All entries must be family-friendly in nature.
- 18. JUDGING: Judging for all entries will be conducted Saturday afternoon after 1:00p. Only JCFA Members, Volunteers and approved Judges will be allowed on the Fairgrounds after 1:00p on Saturday. Winners' names will be posted on the Fairgrounds prior to the end of the Fair and/or posted on JCFA's social media sites.

- 19. If only one entry is entered in a Class, and at Judge's sole discretion, the entry may be awarded a ribbon and premium **if** the Article is worthy of such.
 - **A single entry in a class does not guarantee a ribbon or a premium award**
- 20. Qualified judges will be selected and approved by the JCFA Fair Board. A Judge's decision is final <u>except</u> in the rare occasion determined by a majority vote of the JCFA Board to be controversial or contentious. In such cases the JCFA Fair Board has sole authority to override a judge's decision and adjust place.
- 21. Entries determined by JCFA Fair Board to perpetuate fraud will be disqualified. No ribbon or premium will be awarded regardless of judge's decision and Exhibitor will not be allowed to submit entries at next year's Fair.
- 22. There will be no ties in competitions. In the event a judge's decision results in a tie, the Fair Association President will conduct a coin-toss to break the tie. The lowest Exhibitor Tag Number shall be called as "heads" for the purpose of a tie-breaker.
- 23. In an event beyond the control of JCFA that necessitates the Fair to be postponed or cancelled, JCFA reserves the right and the Exhibitor herein agrees, premiums will be awarded on basis of conditions at time judging is commenced.
- 24. **DISPLAYING ENTRIES:** All Entries will remain on display for the duration of the Fair. JCFA will take precautions to safeguard entries; however, JCFA nor its volunteers assume liability for exhibits or personal belongings while on the Fairgrounds. Adult and Youth Foods will be refrigerated at night and disposed of as the Article spoils or at the conclusion of the Fair, whichever comes first.
- 25. REMOVING EXHIBITS AFTER THE FAIR/CLAIMING PREMIUM PAYOUT: The schedule to remove and pick-up exhibits and/or receive premium award is: Sunday (Sept 28th) 2:00p and 4:00p or Tuesday (Sept 30th) 10:00a and 2:00p Items left on the Fairgrounds after 2:00p on Tuesday following the Fair will become the property of JCFA and items will be disposed of as JCFA deems necessary.

Bee Fact: Beekeepers provide valuable services to the population and agricultural community in Southern states. Many beekeepers produce honey, which they sell to retailers or directly to consumers. In addition, many specialty crops grown in the South rely on pollinators – both wild pollinators and those managed by beekeepers - to produce fruit and seeds. Blueberries and watermelon in particular are entirely dependent on insect pollinators, and other crops such as avocados, oranges, strawberries, and tomatoes are moderately dependent on insect pollinators (Mallinger et al. 2021). Reflecting this dependence, the largest number of acres that farmers pay to have pollinated in many Southern states is blueberries, followed by watermelon.

Bee Fact: Honeybees live in nests or hives in honeycomb structures that bees build using beeswax shaped with their mouths. Each comb consists of hexagon wax structures called cells. Thousands of cells make up each comb and are used to store honey and pollen and are also nurseries for developing bees. A honeybee colony is made up of three types of bees – a Queen, Workers and Drones – and average 50,000 to 60,000 honeybees in the colony with the majority being Worker bees. There is only one Queen and her job is to lay up to 3,000 eggs per day and regulate activities of the hive. The Queen is the mother of all the Worker bees. As their name implies, Worker bees do all the work to collect pollen and nectar and are responsible for feeding and raising young bees. They are also all female. Drone bees number an average 3,000 per hive and their job is to mate with a Queen. A Drone dies once he mates. Most bees, like Honeybees and Bumblebees, live together in hives, but carpenter, digger and mining bees live alone and make their own nest.

A Worker Honeybee will visit 50-100 flowers per trip from the hive and make an average of 1/12 of a teaspoon of honey in her short life. A pound of honey is made from bees visiting an average of 2 million flowers and 55,000 miles flown back and forth to bring pollen and nectar to the hive. One ounce of honey would fuel a bees' flight around the world! Honeybees never sleep.

How you can help pollinators: Pollinators play a key role in ensuring we have an abundant food supply and a vibrant ecosystem. One way you can contribute to pollinator health is by growing a pollinator garden in your home or community garden. Providing safe and healthy gardens can reduce stress, improve nutrition and supply robust habitats for pollinators, who need a healthy pesticide-free food source throughout their lives. Unfortunately many parks and gardens only grow plants that bloom during the peak summer season. The number of pollinators and native bees visiting will increase exponentially by planting a variety of plants that bloom from early spring through autumn! Farmers are experimenting with planting strips of native wildflowers between rows of crops to attract pollinators and insects that eat crop-damaging pests, and some farmers rent bees to pollinate their crops. The farmer is able to reduce pesticide use and this practice is better for our environment and pollinators!

<u>Popular plants to attract bees</u>: pansy, cornflower, calendula, cosmos, zinnia, phlox, aster, black-eyed susan, bee balm, catmint, allium, liatris, yarrow, oregano, lupine and crocus.

<u>Popular flowering shrubs and bushes to attract bees</u>: blackberry and raspberry shrubs, blueberry shrubs, butterfly bush, lilac, privet, hydrangea, blackthorn, buttonbrush, firethorn, guelder rose.
